





Durango was founded by the Denver & Rio Grande Railway in 1880. The railroad arrived in Durango on August 5, 1881 and construction on the line to Silverton began in the fall of the same year. 



How and when was Durango founded?

Durango was founded by the Denver & Rio Grande Railway in 1880. The railroad arrived in Durango on August 5, 1881, and construction on the line to Silverton began in the fall of the same year. By July of 1882 (amazingly only nine months after construction began), the tracks to Silverton were completed and the train began hauling both freight and passengers.

FAQ'S

How long has the railroad been taking passengers on excursions?

Those involved with the railroad were always aware of the spectacular experience it presented and they promoted these scenic opportunities very early on. In addition to its purpose as a freight railroad, it was officially promoted as a scenic attraction July 1882.

How many passengers does the D&SNGRR carry per year?

In 2021, nearly 220,000 passengers rode the Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad.

Has the D&SNGRR "starred" in any films?

Absolutely! The D&SNGRR has appeared in Colorado Territory (1949), Ticket to Tomahawk (1950), Denver and Rio Grande (1952), Viva Zapata (1952), Three Young Texans (1954), Run for Cover (1955), Maverick Queen (1956), Around the World in 80 Days (1956), Night Passage (1957), How the West Was Won (1963), Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid (1969), Support Your Local Gunfighter (1970), The Tracker (1987), Durango Kid (1999), The Claim (2000), The Prestige (2006), Godless miniseries (2017), IMAX film, "Into America's Wild" (2020), and Hostile Territory (2022).

How narrow is the narrow gauge?

Narrow gauge rails are three feet (36 inches) apart, while standard gauge rails are four feet, eight and one half inches (56½ inches) apart.

Why is narrow gauge used?

Denver & Rio Grande Railway builder William Jackson Palmer chose rails spread 3 feet apart when the railroad was conceived. Inspired by the use of narrow gauge he saw in visiting the UK, Palmer was attracted to the versatility of this gauge to accommodate steeper grades and sharper curves through the mountainous regions the railroad would encounter. The reduced capital expense to build narrow gauge equipment was also a large contributing factor.

What is the total value of gold and silver the D&SNGRR has carried?

Over its 142-year-old history, the D&SNGRR has transported over \$300 million in precious metals.

How much fuel and water does a steam locomotive need for one roundtrip?

The locomotives use between 800 and 900 gallons of fuel oil, and 10,000 gallons of water for a roundtrip to Silverton. Our coal burning locomotives use about six tons on average.

How fast does the train go?

20 mph is top speed with an average speed of 15 mph through the canyons to Silverton. Slower speeds are observed on the highline.

How many miles does the train accumulate after one day?

The train travels 45 miles to Silverton, making a total of 95-100 miles in one day.

Is mileage recorded?

Passenger miles are recorded but locomotive and car miles are not. Unlike automobiles, locomotives do not have odometers. Use of our locomotives is not tracked in miles but rather by days, and how those days are recorded depends on if it's a steam or diesel locomotive. For the diesels, it's all about the calendar. Every 92 calendar days a diesel is available for service, regardless of what it is used for, it requires an inspection. While there is the ability for "out of service credit" on the diesels, we can usually mark it on the calendar, literally, when it needs its quarterly inspection. For the steam locomotives it's based on "service days", or any day a locomotive has a fire, and boiler pressure above atmospheric pressure; regardless of what service it's performing. The mechanical department tracks service days, and every 31 service days performs a boiler wash and comprehensive inspection of the locomotive. This is why our steam locomotives are used on a rotational basis to spread out the service days. All of this information, and records of inspection are filed regularly with the Federal Railway Administration.

How many employees does it take to run the train?

The train requires five employees plus concession and private car attendants. Two employees work in the locomotive cab (the engineer and fireman), and two brakemen and one conductor work throughout the entire train.

How does one become a conductor? How does one become an engineer?

Both positions require special exams and on-the-job training. To become a conductor, one must first become a brakeman and work under the conductor. It typically takes more than four years to become an engineer. One begins as a brakeman, then progresses to working in the cab alongside the engineer as a fireman. Then, one must study mechanical instruction and take student trips.

What is the oldest part of the railroad?

The sand house was built in 1881 and the depot was constructed in 1882.

What is the oldest D&SNGRR locomotive?

RGS #42 is the oldest and is currently on display in the museum. It was built in 1887. The steam locomotives we use daily were built between 1923 and 1928, while most of our diesels were built in 1969.

Who owns the D&SNGRR?

American Heritage Railways purchased the D&SNGRR in the summer of 1998 under the leadership of Chairman Allen C. Harper and President Carol Harper.



TAKE THE TRAIN UP, STAY THE NIGHT AND EXPERIENCE AN ELEVATED ADVENTURE

D&SNG RAILROAD

Hop on the Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad for an overnight adventure you won't forget! Spend the night in Silverton to discover all that summer in the San Juan Mountains has to offer. This little mountain town has something for everyone!

ALPINE LOOP

Colorado's Alpine Loop Scenic and Historic Byway has a narrow window in which it's snow-free (June to September). But it's worth the wait! The 65-mile scenic drive travels through a picturesque landscape of treeless tundra and mountains bathed in vistas of color. This backcountry loop connects Ouray, Lake City, and Silverton.

JEEPING

Some of the country's best four-wheel-drive roads are found in the area around Silverton. Whether you are exploring ghost towns and mining camps left over from the 1800's along the Alpine Loop or taking in the beauty of the mountains, Silverton is the perfect base camp. Jeep rentals are available if you want to explore these roads on your own. If you prefer to ride along, try a guide company that can take you into the high country.

RAFTING

Access world-class upper Animas River whitewater rafting right out of Silverton. At peak flows, this is one of the most demanding commercial whitewater runs in the U.S. During the rest of the season, which is 80-90% of the time, this is a trip for anyone with a sense of adventure and a love of the outdoors.

HORSEBACK RIDING

An exciting way to see the San Juan Mountains is by horseback. You'll find several stables and outfitters in the area to help. Let these guides show you into the backcountry for summer thrills.

FISHING

The San Juan Mountains provide crystal clear waters for dropping a line. Many rivers and streams are within easy reach of Silverton, and our high alpine lakes offer up excellent pan-size trout. Town-owned Molas Lake Park & Campground, 5 miles south of town, is a popular spot to cast your line with easy access.

HIKING

Hiking opportunities abound in the San Juan Mountains. Trails of varying lengths and difficulties provide something for everyone. Stop by the Silverton Visitors Center and San Juan Public Lands Office at 414 Greene Street for more information.

SUMMER ITINERARIES

SHORT TRIP DAY 1

All aboard the Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad for a historic train ride. You can choose between the full day Silverton Train adventure or, if you are looking for a shorter experience, the 5-hour Cascade Canyon Express that only travels halfway to Silverton. Both excursions depart from our Durango Depot, skirting the edges of the Animas River and climbing along the sides of the picturesque Rocky Mountains through the beautiful San Juan National Forest. Enjoy ample photo opportunities as well as unforgettable memories to last a lifetime. Upon your return, explore the FREE Roundhouse Museum located at the Durango Depot.

DAY 2

Explore Mesa Verde National Park, a UNESCO World Heritage Site located 35 miles west of Durango that features the bestpreserved Ancestral Puebloan cliff dwellings with over 4,000 ruin sites and 600 cliff dwellings, including the renowned Cliff Palace.

DAY 3

Rent a mountain bike and ride from downtown Durango to **Horse Gulch** and take on over 30 miles of trail. Or try tubing down the **Animas** River and enjoy the cool flow of mountain waters over your skin. Later, dig into a delicious barbecue supper and genuine western stage show with the Bar D Chuckwagon.

EXTENDED STAY DAY 4

Take a hike on the stunning Colorado Trail before relaxing at Durango Hot Springs. Then check out Honeyville and Honey House Distillery where all of the products and spirits are distilled from or blended with honey. Later, experience the fascinating local

agriculture scene by taking a tour of and dining at James Ranch.

DAY 5

Set out on a driving adventure along the San Juan Skyway as you follow the 236-mile Million Dollar Highway through the San Juan Mountains to Silverton and Ouray, viewing breathtaking terrain before looping back to Durango.

DAY 6

Embark on a whitewater adventure on the Animas River before catching a glimpse of Durango's western heritage at the True Western Round Up Open Rodeo.

DAY 7

Mount up for a horseback ride into the Colorado backcountry and then top it off with an unforgettable dose of Durango's vibrant nightlife.

FALL IS FANTASTIC

See some of the most stunning wilderness that Colorado has to offer. Experience full on autumn splendor from the comfort of a Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Train. Besides the train, fun fall activities include jeeping, mountain biking, hiking and horseback riding. And the bright explosion of aspens rival the sunshine in full golden splendor. There's just so much to see and do during autumn's crisp days in southwest Colorado.

FALL ITINERARIES

SHORT TRIP DAY 1

Sit back, relax, and breathe in the crisp mountain air on board the Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad. Enjoy the colorful fall foliage as the train tracks alongside the Animas River on its journey through the San Juan National Forest. When you return, be sure to visit the FREE Roundhouse Museum located at the Durango Depot.

DAY 2

Take a hike up Horse Gulch or Animas Mountain for some truly incredible natural views. Alternatively, take a hike up the Skysteps Trail for a panoramic view of the Durango area before descending back into town for a stroll along the Animas River Trail where you'll seethe aspens aglow with fall's radiance.

Join a Jeep tour and explore historic mining towns in the backcountry surrounding Silverton. You can also drive up La Plata Canyon, an area known for its past mining operations. It's best explored in a 4x4 vehicle, but you can always park and hike in on foot. You'll discover ghost towns, waterfalls, and lots of brilliant golden aspens.

EXTENDED STAY

DAY 4

Take a spectacular drive on the San Juan Skyway, one of the most incredible drives in the country. You'll wind your way to Silverton, Ouray, Ridgway, Telluride, and then back to Durango through Rico and Mancos.

DAY 5

Enjoy the brisk autumn air from horseback as you take a ride into the backcountry. On your way back to town, stop by James Ranch and chow down on lunch.

DAY 6

Delve deeper into local history by visiting Mesa Verde National Park, which features the bestpreserved Ancestral Puebloan cliff dwellings with over 4,000 ruin sites and 600 cliff dwellings, including the renowned Cliff Palace.

DAY 7

Rent an OHV (Off Highway Vehicle) and explore some of the many local backroads and ghost towns while enjoying the spectacular fall foliage. Then, take the opportunity to experience local agriculture with a tour of James Ranch.

DAY 2

Hit the slopes at **Purgatory Resort**. With over 260" of annual snowfall and every snow activity imaginable from downhill skiing, snowboarding, and much more, the snowy slopes await.

DAY 3

Take some time to relax in the warmth of

Durango Hot Springs, before dining at one of the award-winning local restaurants.

EXTENDED STAY DAY 4

Take a magical sleigh ride, go snowmobiling, or hit the slopes again at **Purgatory**, one of the local ski resorts. Or, if you are looking for something even closer, head on over to **Chapman Hill Ice Rink** for some local ice skating.

DAY 5

Explore Mesa Verde National Park, a UNESCO World Heritage Site 35 miles west of Durango. Afterwards, attend a riveting performance at the San Juan Symphony.

DAY 6


Make the journey to beautiful Vallecito Lake for some ice fishing or groomed corduroy Nordic Skiing on the winter recreation trail system.

LOCAL ARTIST HIGHLIGHT



A step inside The 9318 Collective, brings you into a whimsical space; splashes of color within frames and on canvas, jewelry and lights sparkle, a big table in back where artists convene and instruct, even a special place for local children to sell their handmade goods. Beth Anderson opened The 9318 Collective in 2020 to create an encouraging space for emerging crafters, lifelong artists and everyone in between. For her, it is a dream come true.

The 9318 Collective provides nearly 30 local artists a space to share and sell art. It is a creative community where artists brainstorm ideas for growth, manage success and overcome challenges. The artists at The 9318 Collective have a vested interest in the outcome of their individual art businesses and that of the collective as a whole. Gina Rosato of The Creative Crackerjack, a graphic design firm in Silverton, refers to this as a Lion's Gate where power is generated when many minds are focusing on the same thing - we help each other and problem solve together.

> Gina got her start in the graphic design industry nearly 20 years ago when she was first assigned to the All Aboard magazine, where she is still currently involved as the Art Director. Gina's signature style has a retro flair that can be seen in her other business, Route 550 Gifts, where she designs souvenirs inspired by Silverton. Gina has recently expanded her repertoire, working as an Integrated Digital Artist using mixed media techniques within the digital art world where she creates historical wildscapes of the San Juan Mountains. The creative and business support network of The 9318 Collective has helped fuel the growth of both of Gina's businesses.

> Many of the artists at The 9318 Collective are inspired by the environment that surrounds Silverton. Wesley Berg takes us nose to nose with nature with incredibly up-close photographs of local fauna. One shot of a determined looking Stellar Jay taking flight is so detailed one might instinctually flinch at first glance. Wes' interest in wildlife photography started about 7 years ago, however he bought his first "serious camera" in the mid 1990's when he started mountaineering. What began as an inclination to capture the spectacular scenery from high alpine peaks turned into a desire to educate. As his photo catalog of species grows he hopes others will become inspired to protect and preserve these animals and their habitats. The 9318 Collective exposes Wes' work to the world in a way he couldn't on his own.

As the founder of The 9318 Collective, Beth Anderson is grateful for the creation of such an artistic community in Silverton. If not for the local artists who support the mission of The 9318 Collective, the space would not exist. Every visit ensures a face-to-face encounter with one of the artists due to the co-operative model.

Beth Anderson's acrylic paintings are in a bold abstract realism style. Her paintings replicate the shapes, colors and patterns of life and nature, while also muting and exaggerating other details within a scene. Beth is always on the lookout for the signs and synchronicities of life, which are woven into her art. Her new series, Animal Spirit Guides, is a result of these signs from nature. Beth's artistic journey began in 2010 when she worked with reclaimed wood and upcycled materials to make mosaic wall art. One can see that Beth creates wherever she is. The 9318 Collective displays Beth's artistic touch from product placement, refurbished furniture to her handmade stylings. Beth's hope for the future is to continue supporting the arts and artists in Silverton by finding ways to move out of our comfort zones both within the confines of 1212 Greene Street and by bringing art out into the world.

The Grand Dame of San Juan County turns 140 this summer. Her birthday will be commemorated with a plaque. The plaque will be placed upon her original granite walls. The Grand Dame, or the Grand Imperial Hotel as it is known to most, was commissioned in 1882 and completed not quite 10 months later. Quite a feat for the era. The mansard roofed structure was once renowned as the largest single standing building south of Denver. The "Grand" has undergone multiple restorations and even a few name changes over the decades, but her beauty and utility remain the same.

Jim Harper and his family business American Heritage Railways Hotels purchased the Grand Imperial Hotel in 2015 and immediately began a full-scale restoration project. Restoration included infrastructure, refurbishment and decor. Harper, who clearly enjoys history, thinks of the Grand Imperial as a metaphor for the town of Silverton. Both of which survived the many feast and famine periods of the mining industry.

The Grand Imperial Hotel was originally built to accommodate the influx of miners, visitors and businessmen that flocked to Silverton during the early prospect years. Today, it offers an authentic Victorian experience, with a basement theatre and ballroom that includes a crystal chandelier, ornate wallpaper and plush carpets. In decades past hotel rooms were solely on the third floor. For almost 25 years the second floor held the offices of Town Hall and the County Courthouse. The use of the hotel has shifted with the needs

of the community. Today the basement hosts San Juan Development Association, Silverton's business resource center and a theatre space. Community members are encouraged to use this space for gatherings and performances.

Give "the Grand" a visit on your next trip into Silverton. Whether you're coming from rail or trail, the staff welcomes you with its family-friendly vibe. Rest in luxurious opulence in one of 32 Victorian-styled rooms, enjoy a meal and live piano at the Lacey Rose Saloon or shop for stunning jewelry at K&C Traders and grab a coffee at Elevated Coffee Company located all on-site.

"American Heritage Railways Hotels and the Harper Family are proud to be a part of Silverton's past, present and future," said Harper. "Silverton is a magnificent place – like no other on Earth."





A STUDY IN LOCOMOTIVE EXCELLENCE AND DURABILITY



antiquated narrow-gauge empire. Once in service, the 470's quickly became the pride of the railroads narrow gauge fleet and handled the most important jobs the D&RGW could find for them, including the San Juan and Shavano passenger trains. After just shy of two decades worth of service, in late 1941, the U.S.

In late summer 1923, the Salida, CO newspapers were abuzz with talk of the latest narrow-gauge locomotives being delivered to the Denver and Rio Grande Western Railroad, a group of ten locomotives that were soon dubbed "Sports Models" by the crews assigned to them. These "sports models" were built by American Locomotive Works of Schenectady, NY who, for decades, were known for building some of the largest, and most modern steam locomotives in the United States. Compared to the mainline giants of their day, this lot of narrow-gauge locomotives were diminutive, yet in contrast to other narrow-gauge power, rather large. Built as 2-8-2 Mikado type locomotives but more commonly referred to as K28's (K stands for Mikado and 28 is for their roughly 28,000 lbs. of tractive force) they were numbered 470 thru 479 on the D&RGW. These ten Mikado's were delivered at a time when the railroad was in the midst of undertaking its last extensive improvements to its

was on the verge of entering WWII and the Government was looking for additional equipment to ship to Skagway, Alaska for use on the White Pass and Yukon Railroad to help with the construction of the Alcan Highway and pipeline. In answer to the Government's request, the D&RGW sent seven of the ten K28's north, and after three years of intense service in Alaska, in 1945, the seven locomotives were sent back to the lower 48 states and subsequently scrapped. Throughout the war however, the D&RGW retained locomotive numbers 473, 476, and 478 where they remained in faithful service, mostly on the Silverton branch until the D&RGW sold them, along with the rest of the Durango to Silverton line in 1981. Since then, all three have been iconic staples of the Durango and Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad.

Since first being placed in regular service in 1923, the 473, 476, and 478, more commonly referred to as the "three", "six" and "eight" to those who work on them, may hold the title of most profitable steam locomotives ever constructed in the United States. When you stop and consider how much revenue they have earned for their different owners in 100 years of existence, the miles traveled, the freight hauled, and the people they have safely delivered, it's a record that is unlikely to be matched. What's equally remarkable is how reliably each of the three locomotives have performed. In just the four plus decades that they have carried the Durango and Silverton name, they have each operated hundreds upon hundreds of thousands of miles. Unbelievably, the 473 alone has never been removed from service for any length longer than two years, and that only for routine maintenance and rebuilding.

This longevity and reliability are a testament to their design and construction. When around them regularly, you quickly realize they each have their own unique personality and quirks. Once you begin to work on them, disassemble them, and get into the mechanics of them, there's subtle aspects about them that are superior to their larger K36 and K37 stablemates. Functions such as details within the suspension system, and components of the Walscherts valve motion design all have improvements that make them crew and mechanic favorites. As has been proven, they are locomotives that with care, are designed to be rebuilt and last for a long time.

Despite their qualities in design, they are the smallest locomotives the D&SNG rosters. In simple terms, one K28 can pull a maximum ten car train to Silverton. Compare that to a K36 (480 class) pulling 12, or a K37 (490 class) that can handle 13 cars unassisted on the steep grades along the Animas River. The simple math of economics, and the popularity of the D&SNG has, at periods of time, made the K28's afterthoughts to the more powerful locomotives. To help keep the playing field level for the K28's, in recent years the D&SNG has gone to an operating schedule that includes regularly scheduled double headers (trains powered by two locomotives) in the peak season. This type of scheduling has brought a new level of relevance to the smaller locomotives. After all, the D&SNG averages around 600 steam service days a year, which in simple terms that's each day a steam locomotive is in use. Spreading out that total number of service days amongst all the operating locomotives as much as possible is imperative to the long-term sustainability of each of them. Of the three K28's, the 478 can be found in the Durango Roundhouse Museum, while both the 473 and 476 will see regular service during the 2023 season.

A century after being built, all three of these locomotives remain largely as they were built, with the lone exception that both the 473 and 476 now burn reclaimed fuel oil rather than coal. These fuel conversions, done in 2020 and 2021 respectively, is one more step in maintaining them and keeping them sustainable for the future.

If you look up at the front of the train you're on and see one of these proud locomotives, have no doubt that with proper maintenance, the "three", "six", and "eight" will all be around, and in operation for a long time to come on the D&SNG.

REBUILDING ® 211

FOR HINSDALE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Often times, due to contractual obligations, we are unable to showcase our contract projects. One active project we can showcase is the ongoing restoration of former Denver and Rio Grande combine 211. This car is owned by the Hinsdale County Historical Society in Lake City, CO. As a side note, Hinsdale County is roughly only 30 miles from Silverton as the crow flies, yet over 200 miles by paved road!

Backstory:

Car 211 was originally constructed by Jackson and Sharp in 1881 for the D&RG as coach number 74. Later renumbered 298, the car served as a standard coach until it was converted to a combine (half coach - half baggage car) in 1900 for use on the branch lines of the D&RG. Being able to seat 22 passengers and handle the mail and a small amount of freight, a car of the 211's design was ideally suited to handle the limited traffic on some of the most rust covered, weed choked, light weight rails of the D&RG's system, such as the Lake City branch. With the Lake City branch abandonment in 1933, and an ever-decreasing need for a combine car on other routes, the 211 found fewer opportunities for work until it was finally declared

surplus and was stricken from the roster in the early 1940's. Its trucks and metal parts removed, 211 spent most of the next 75 years moving from place to place within Colorado, first as a chicken coop, then as a derelict artifact, until finally in 2017 it was brought back home to Lake City.

Present:

In 2021, the Hinsdale County Historical Society contracted with the Durango and Silverton Railroad to restore car 211 to its late 1920's appearance. Work began in Lake City with a full assessment of the car followed by fabrication of bolsters and truss rods in order to set the car back on wheels. In August 2022, the 211 was transported to Durango where the core portion of its extensive restoration was to begin. Throughout the end of 2022, the car received major frame repairs, including a full sill replacement, significant wall and roof section replacements and all new end platforms with couplers. Building off this restoration work, in 2023 the car will see continued roof work, new siding and trim along with door and window installation. Work on the 211 has been an exercise in using wood

working skills of a bygone era; similar to restoring an old house, just one that rides on rails.

The full restoration is expected to continue well into 2024. All funding has come entirely from donations and grant sources including the Colorado State Historic Fund, National Trust for Historic Preservation and El Pomar Foundation.

When completed, the 211 will be a centerpiece exhibit at the Hinsdale County Museum in Lake City. It will serve as a shining example that anything can be saved, and brought back to life with enough dedication, fortitude, and skill.

It now takes visitors on the same tracks through the towering San Juan Mountains, along the Animas River and past aweinspiring vistas and waterfalls. You can also see the D&SNGR guest star in classic films like Butch Cassidy & the Sundance Kid and Around the World in 80 Days.

Cultural Heritage

Durango is blessed with being located just 35 miles west of Mesa Verde National Park, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, where you can observe some of the most well-preserved cliff dwellings of the Ancestral Puebloans. Other notable indigenous cultural sites include the Ute Mountain Tribal Park, Hovenweep National Monument, Crow Canyon Archaeological Center, Canyons of the Ancients and Chimney Rock National Monument. Additionally, Durango's local college, Ft. Lewis College, is deeply connected with local tribes and its Center of Southwest Studies features an extensive collection of culturally significant objects.



The DURANGO & SILVERTON NARROW GAUGE RAILROAD MUSEUM:

TAKE A STEP BACK IN TIME AND SPARK YOUR IMAGINATION

The Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad was created to share the fascinating history of railroading, transportation and mining with people from around the world. The 12,000 square foot museum was created in 1998 utilizing 8 stalls of the 'new' 15-stall roundhouse built in 1989. Many families and old railroad workers continue to donate artifacts that tell the history of railroading, especially from the D&RGW line. Since its inception, this museum has grown into an all-encompassing transportation and local history museum that includes planes, trains, automobiles, and boats. Each item tells a unique story of how railroads played a vital role in the growth and development of western communities and the way the railroad has affected so many aspects of life here in the Animas Valley and beyond.

Find out what drove miners to the San Juan Mountains by exploring our outstanding mineral collection. Climb aboard one of our steam locomotives to get an up-close look at how a train operates. Perch in a caboose cupola for the best seat in the house to view our 800 square foot model train layout.

You can also unwind while watching an engaging documentary in our theater car. In the classic film Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid, Agent Woodcock defended Mr. E.H. Herriman in this exact car. Or duck into our doghouse, a little shack located on the locomotive's tender. And if you are visiting with kids, ask for a scavenger hunt activity to learn more about our exhibits and win a prize if you find all the clues.

Bringing history to life and showcasing the hardships, the struggles, the triumphs and the growth of Durango and the surrounding areas are inextricably woven into the fabric of the railroad museum. It is much more than exhibits of trains, planes and automobiles, pick axes, switch locks and oil cans. It truly brings to life the rich history of the relationships between the people, the railroad and the land and how it all resulted in

developing the western communities in the rugged Rocky Mountains of southwest Colorado.

When guests enter the museum, they are greeted with unique relics of the past, each with its own particular set of stories. Each artifact in the museum has a special connection to Durango by way of the railroad. The fire truck and the airplane exhibits were "firsts" for Durango and they were transported here by, you guessed it, the railroad. You'll also see an 800 square foot model railroad depicting the railroads as they operated in the 1950's, vintage railroad cars, historical photos, railroad art, wildlife exhibits, and much more. Several of the antique automobiles you'll see were brought by rail, reflecting a time when mountain roads were too treacherous for long distance travel. The 1923 Nash automobile, lacking a back seat, was used locally to haul milk and cream for a Bayfield dairy.

Some of the exhibits include:

Jackson and Sharp Immigrant Coach 460 Sleeper Car - Coach 460 is very rare and has a fascinating history. It has not been restored, is in excellent condition and has recently been opened up to allow visitors to walk through it!

"The Freedom is Not Free" exhibit features an extensive collection of hand-cast hand-painted lead models of servicemen representing every American military conflict from the Revolutionary War through the war in Afghanistan. Al Harper, himself, served honorably as a Captain in the United States Air Force from 1967-1971 and this is one way for him to show appreciation to all military personnel and their families for their service to our country.

The Animas River Display features a 600 gallon custom aquarium built to replicate the current natural habitat of the Animas River. This exhibit

allows guests to gain a better understanding of the enormous impact this river has had on the railroad and the area as well as the importance of having fresh clean water. The aquarium is currently stocked with rainbow trout with future plans to introduce Colorado River Cutthroat and German Brown Trout.

The museum continues its growth with donations from many individuals and families who want to preserve and share artifacts with the thousands of people who visit each year.

We invite you to step back in time and explore the Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Museum where history comes to life! And if you have a special event such as a corporate event or party or even a wedding, call to inquire about hosting your event at our one of a kind venue.

The Durango & Silverton Narrow Gauge Railroad is Free and open to the public every day the train operates.


